
September general guild membership meeting called to order 02:01 PM by President, Nancy Moore Minutes of previous meeting were approved as presented Treasurer's Report noted August 2021 Balance of \$11,041.40

September 2021 to date \$11,161.40 (Detailed filing to be presented to President and filed for final audit)

The membership chair reported 38 members & guests were in attendance. The 3 visitors were recognized and warmly welcomed.

Karen Troutman presented to the representative of The Masonic Lodge a beautiful quilt for them to sell raffle tickets as part of their 2021 fund raiser. The Lodge had warmly welcomed our membership into their Lodge without any charge for our meetings until we could complete the process with Westminster Presbyterian Church for us to return to their church for our meetings.

The Baby Quilt Chair gave a detailed report of the quilts turned in last month (which was 19). She delivered 32 to the NICU last month. Our average is 30 quilts donated per month. We have 58 baby quilts on hand. Those include 26 boys, 14 girls, 7 twins, and 6



No VA report as our chairperson was not in attendance.

Discussed points for helping with selling tickets for the raffle quilt at expo and quilt shows. Debbie Grice reported we need to sell more raffle tickets for current quilt. Also need more to sign up to help sell tickets at Sanford Quilt Show in October.

Birthday cards have been distributed to members who celebrated their birthdays this month; also, needing thinking of you cards or other needs.

Colleen welcomed our own Sana Moulder, who presented the history of sewing machines and the fabrics and quilts throughout history, dating back to 14th century. Next meeting will be about the designs of antique quilts and their preservation processes.

Colleen presented numerous door prizes and the fat quarter winner October fat quarter theme will be some type of fall theme, any colors or designs.

The next Board meeting will be 10/11 at Colleen's house at 6:30, The general membership meeting will be 10/17 at the Westminster Presbyterian Church at 2:00.

October 17th Program Sleeping Under History – Vintage Quilts



Have a vintage quilt you don't know much about? Are you wondering how you can clean and display your family heirloom? Bring one vintage quilt to the **October 17 Tarheel Quilters' Guild** meeting to learn more. Jessie Taliaferro of Quilt Rehab is a Quilt Restoration Specialist who will share examples from her vintage quilt collection (1825 – 1938). Reference books of patterns and fabric styles of different eras will also be exhibited. Through a special "show & Tell," Jessie will help you identify the name of your quilt's pattern and approximate when it was made. You will also hear expert tips on caring for and displaying your special quilt.

Quilt Restoration Specialist Jessie Taliaferro learned to sew at her mother's knee. Her interest in repairing vintage quilts began with her own family's quilts, which over the years suffered from too much sun, too much use or too many pets! Quilt Rehab was established in 2015. Since then, Jessie has restored, rebuilt or repurposed over 250 quilts. Jessie is a member of the Capital Area Quilters' Guild and the Chair of the Vintage Quilt Study Group. QUILT CARE

Washing:

- · NEVER dryclean! Chemicals will damage your quilt.
- Use a gentle soap: Restoration, Retroclean, Ivory Soap, Orvis Quilt Soap
- Use warm to cool water hot water may cause colors to bleed! Red, black, brown blue and purple are most likely to bleed. Use a colorcatcher.
- Fan fold the quilt and handwash in soapy water in the bathtub or a Kiddie Pool outside. Soaking may be necessary, but watch for bleeding colors. Agitate the quilt gently, lifting it in and out of the water.
- Repeat with clear rinse water as many times as it takes to get all the soap out.
- No soap can be used if the quilt is only dusty and not dirty.

Spot Cleaning:

- Whenever possible, do not wash the quilt at all.
- Spot clean with a solution of 2 parts Hydrogen Peroxide, 1 part Dawn Dish Soap.

ENJOY YOUR QUILT!

It was made to be seen and appreciated. Any stains or fading add to the history of your quilt.

Drying:

- While the quilt is still laying in the tub, squeeze as much water out as possible.
- Roll in beach towels to extract more water. Lifting a sodden quilt can damage threads.
- Lay the quilt flat on a sheet on your patio or on the grass or over some deck chairs on a dry sunny day. Do not hang. Another sheet can be used as a cover to protect the quilt from the sun.
- Once the top side is dry, flip the quilt over to dry the other side.

Displaying:

- Lay the quilt on a bed. You can layer several quilts, rotating them so a different one is exposed every few months.
- Hang a quilt using a hanging sleeve. This distributes the weight evenly and protects the threads.
- Store in a pillowcase or cotton bag or sheet. Refold twice a year.
- Do not let the quilt touch wood. Oils from the wood will stain. Make sure there is a piece of fabric or towel between the quilt and any wood surface.
- Do not store in plastic.

SCHOLARSHIP REPORT

The Scholarship year is drawing to a close. How can that be? Scholarship Point Tally Sheets will be due at the November Guild meeting on 11/21. Guild Members earn points throughout the year by participating in various Guild activities (as listed on the tally sheet). To clarify some items: Guild Outreach Activities are one point per hour. This includes delivery of baby and VA quilts (when we are able to do this again), selling raffle tickets at a venue such as the Quilt Expo or Quilt Shows (such as Sanford), and acting as an Ambassador at Quilt Expo. Not listed on the sheet are making Christmas stockings for the NICU and making placemats for Meals on Wheels. At the bottom of the sheet is a Misc. category. Write in placemats here and give yourself two points per placemat donated. On the blank line below Misc., write in Christmas Stockings and give yourself two points per Christmas stocking donated.

Service pins will be given to all members who made 4 or more service quilts (2 VA and 2 baby or 1 VA and 3 baby). To qualify for workshop scholarships and free membership, you must have 45 points in addition to making the 4 service quilts. If you have any questions, please contact me.

"Options" - #9 - Birds in Flight Written by Abigail Dolinger, Dec. 2020

Make two (three, four) 8 ½" blocks that will finish at 8" in the "Options" quilt. For your first block, try the Primary Design. Then choose one of the Options for another second block. You could simply vary the colors/fabrics used, or rearrange the orientation of the half square triangles (HSTs), or substitute squares for some of the small HSTs.

Primary Design










Plan your blocks – use colored pencils to fill in the spaces







Sewing the Primary Design

Step 1 – Make half square triangles (HSTs).

Pair the 5" background square and the 5" colorful square (red), right sides together. Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner on the wrong side of the background square. Sew ¼" away from each side of the drawn line. Cut on the drawn diagonal line and the press seam allowances toward the colorful triangles. *Trim HSTs to measure 4 ½.*"





Similarly, make eight HSTs using the four 3" background squares and the four 3" colorful squares. *Trim the HSTs to measure 2 ½" square.*




Step 2 - Sew the HSTs together as two units of four HSTs each. Each unit measures 4 ½" square.



Step 3 – Assemble the block.

Arrange and sew the HST units as a Four Patch with two rows of two units each.



The block measures 8 ½," unfinished and will finish at 8" when sewn into the quilt.

Sewing Option A

Step 1 – Make half square triangles (HSTs).

Pair the 5" background square and the 5" colorful square (red), right sides together. Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner on the wrong side of the background square. Sew ¼" away from each side of the drawn line. Cut on the drawn diagonal line and the press seam allowances toward the colorful triangles. *Trim HSTs to measure 4 ½.*"





Similarly, make eight HSTs using the four 3" background squares and the four 3" colorful squares. Trim the HSTs to measure 2 1/2" square.




Step 2 – Sew the HSTs together as two units of four HSTs each. Each unit measures 4 ½" square.





Step 3 – Assemble the block.

Arrange and sew the HST units as a Four Patch with two rows of two units each.



The block measures 8 ½" square, unfinished and will finish at 8" when sewn into the quilt.

Sewing Option B

Step 1 – Make HSTs.

Pair the 5" background square and the 5" colorful square (red), right sides together. Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner on the wrong side of the background square. Sew ¼" away from each side of the drawn line. Cut on the drawn diagonal line and the press seam allowances toward the colorful triangles. Trim HSTs to measure 4 1/2."










Trim to 4 ½" square


Similarly, make four HSTs using the two 3" background squares and the two 3" colorful squares. *Trim the HSTs to measure 2 ½" square.*



Step 2 – Sew the 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " background squares and the smaller HSTs together as two units of four each. Each unit measures 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " square.



Step 3 – Assemble the block. Arrange and sew the HST units as a Four Patch with two rows of two units each.



The block measures 8 ½" square, unfinished and will finish at 8" when sewn into the quilt.
