## VA Quilts

As of today we have 84 VA quilts on hand. Irene Grimes and Nancy Eckert volunteered to make 2 special order quilts for the new cottages at the VA Hospital. Thank you ladies!
"Voices from the Late $20^{\text {th }}$ Century" from articles in the Library of Congress. In 1978 a series of interviews with quilt makers were part of a survey of folk life traditions in the areas of North Carolina and Virginia adjacent to the Blue Ridge Parkway. The interviews were conducted over a period of two months. A small number of women were identified as traditional quiltmakers, those who made quilts as an integral part of their lives in a rural economy. Quilts made by this group reflect the limited selection of woven cotton fabrics and synthetics available during the 1970s. These quilts are either pieced without patterns or are constructed according to traditional patterns that date back to the late $19^{\text {th }}$ century. In 1990s the Coming Home division of the Lands End company and Good Housekeeping magazine sponsored a national contest called "If Quilts Could Talk". The contestants submitted essays along with their quilts. Books and magazines provided a wealth of new patterns and techniques. Manufacturers designed fabrics especially for quilters. Whether working with limited materials and influences or having access to abundant resources, each quilt maker experiences the same sequence of steps in creating a quilt. Quiltmakers themselves recognize that in quilts, they share a common language.

## Border Around - Round 4

This is the 4th Round of Border Around. This month we'll be adding a 4" finished border. Since this border is being added to a 3 " finished border that should measure 27 " finished, you'll need to create a filler border to make the fourth round fit properly. It involves quilt math, but it isn't hard. Read the whole pattern, construct your chosen border and then take the measurements to create the filler. You can use an accent color or you can hide the filler by making it match either the border that you're adding or the third border. This a useful technique for making pieced borders to fit a quilt top or a fabric panel. Every round has also included an option to design your own border - you might choose to add a plain border if life has gotten busy or if you're looking for inspiration, check out the free patterns at equilter.com where there are many designs shown to surround panels. The $5^{\text {th }}$ Round pattern will be in the September newsletter, it will be a $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ border so that your quilt top will finish at 41 " so that you can use a $11 / 4$ yard piece of fabric for backing.

## Christmas Mystery Quilt Layout Instructions

Print out a copy of the layout grid and a color copy of the tree blocks grid. The quilt should finish about $78^{\prime \prime} \times 90^{\prime \prime}$. Each block on the grid represents a $6^{\prime \prime}$ finished block. NOTE: All the empty blocks on the grid are the green background, G9

Using the tan fabric you used in the quilt or another brown fabric of your choice, cut two $61 / 2$ " squares to use as the "trunk" of the tree.

Lay out all of the squares you made using the layout grid to form the tree itself row by row. A design wall (or design bed/floor/counter, etc.) will be very helpful at this point. (Do not sew the blocks together at this time)

In your G9 bag, you should have (14) $61 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times$ WOF strips. These will be sub-cut into various lengths, depending on each row. My WOF is 43 ", but yours may be a little different.

Take two $61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ strips and cut a 37 " length from each strip to sew on each side of Square 21 to make Row 1. This is the "star" at the top of the tree.

Take four $61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ strips and cut a 37" length from each strip to sew on each side of the two brown squares "trunk" of the tree. This will be Rows 14 and 15.

Take two $6 \frac{1}{2} / \prime$ strips and cut (1) $301 / 2 "$ lengths from each strip (Row 2)
Take two $61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ strips and cut (1) $241 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ lengths from each strip (Rows 3)
Take two $61 / 2 \prime$ " strips and cut (2) $181 / 2$ " lengths from each strip (Rows 4 and 7)
Take two $6 \frac{1}{2 \prime \prime}$ strips and cut (3) $121 / 2$ " lengths from each strip (Rows 5, 8, and 11)
You will need a total of (8) $61 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ squares to use on either end of Rows $6,9,10$, and 12 . Cut these squares from the left over fabric from the above rows you cut. Row 13 does not require a G-9 block

Once all the G-9 strips are cut, begin sewing the rows together. You can sew the G-9 strips to each row as you put the tree together block by block, row by row, or, you can sew together all the tree blocks you made row by row and then add the G-9 side pieces; use whatever method works for you. After all the rows are completely put together, begin sewing the completed rows together by whatever method works for you.

It is very important to orient the blocks correctly. Use the color copy of the finished quilt to do this. Be careful because several of the blocks look very much alike with little placement differences within the blocks.

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
